What is the Food System?

- The chain of production, processing, distribution and consumption of food, from "farm to fork"
- Industrial/global system vs. Local/alternative system
- Rural communities role in production and processing of food— on the frontline of changes to the system

Why Local Food System Development

- <u>Economic Development</u>: Agriculture as an Economic Multiplier
- <u>Building Social Capital</u>: Facilitating community interaction and increasing trust
- Well-being: Communities with small, locally based farms have been found to have higher social welfare than communities dominated by industrial agriculture (Goldschmidt 1978, Lobao 1991)
- Health & Environment: Food Safety, Public Heath,
 Protecting Farmland & the Environment

Local Food System Development as Community Development

- View agriculture and food system development as a form of self-development; assets based
- Citizen involvement critical; Process as important as outcomes

 Important Ingredients: Trust, Leadership, Flow of Information, and Organization/Stakeholder Groups

Strategies for Local Food System Development

- Inform decision-making processes by compiling data, researching alternatives, assessing impact, and educating stakeholders

Strategies for Local Food System Development

- Improve healthy food access through zoning, education, and incentives for retailers
 - SNAP and Farmers Market Nutrition Programs
 - Education and Outreach
 - Incentives for healthy food retail
