NADO Seeks Public-Private Partnership to Establish American Small Town Leaders Award Program

This week, the National Association of Development Organizations (NADO) announced it has retained Barton Russell & Associates to develop and manage a new program designed to recognize extraordinary achievements by local elected officials. Russell is former President of the National Center for Small Communities.

Called the American Small Town Leaders Award, "the program will shine a bright light on community leaders who have displayed the highest standards of public service and taken action that substantially improved the quality of life in their hometowns" according to NADO Executive Director Joe McKinney. American Small Town Leaders Award recipients will also receive grants for important local economic development projects. NADO will be inviting Fortune 500 companies with a stake in America's more than 30,000 small towns and cities (and the more than 140 million people who live in them) to become program sponsors of the American Small Town Leaders Award program. ATC Flood Resilience Mobile Workshop: A Can't Miss Opportunity to See Innovative Disaster Recovery First-Hand

Are you interested in learning first-hand about:

- Post-disaster small business recovery and support for entrepreneurs at critical moments;
- Mitigating the economic development impacts of natural disasters on tourism and other sectors;
- Innovative flood management infrastructure like what's described <u>here</u> that also offers transportation and quality of life benefits to the community;
- Tapping into nontraditional partnerships and creative funding mechanisms for recovery, such as private foundations like Oskar Blues Brewery's Can'd Aid Foundation;

Then join us for the "Flood Recovery on the Front Range: Inspiring Stories of Community Resilience" mobile workshop at the ATC on **August 22.** Participants will visit three communities that were impacted by catastrophic flooding last fall—Lyons, a small town; Boulder, a medium-sized city; and an unincorporated area in Boulder County—and hear directly from the mayor and economic development manager of Lyons, leaders from Boulder and Boulder County, FEMA representatives, and others who have been breaking new ground in disaster recovery and rebuilding and have a wealth of inspiring stories and lessons learned to share. It has often been said that the impacts of natural disasters do not stop at jurisdictional boundaries, and recent events across the U.S. have certainly shown this to be true. Nearby cities, towns, and counties usually share the same vulnerabilities and risks, and when they're struck by severe weather, they often experience the same affects. During the recovery process, individual communities can fare better if they collaborate, share ideas and resources, and rebuild in ways that increase resilience, economic competitiveness, and quality of life across the region as a whole. For these reasons, RDOs are critical partners in disaster recovery. With their regional perspective and interdisciplinary focus, their ability to navigate federal programs, their technical expertise, and their broad network of partners at all levels of government and in the private and philanthropic sectors, RDOs can help communities bounce back from disasters more efficiently and effectively.

FCC Announces \$100 Million for Rural Broadband Projects

The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) released its <u>report and order</u> on rural broadband activities and outlined a budget of \$100 million, which will go toward new broadband projects in rural areas. Local governments are eligible to apply for funding. The application deadline is **October 14**. Applicants are required to submit project details, confidential bids requesting the desired amount of support to serve specified census block, and other financial information such as ownership interest in FCC-regulated companies. EPA Webinar on Flood Resilience: Lessons Learned from Vermont's Experience with Tropical Storm Irene

The state of Vermont experienced major damage to roads, houses, and businesses due to the flooding from Tropical Storm Irene in 2011. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) recently concluded a Smart Growth Implementation Assistance project with the Mad River Valley Planning District, state agencies, and FEMA to help communities recover from Irene, producing a Flood Resilience Checklist and report, Planning for Flood Recovery and Long-Term Resilience in Vermont: Smart Growth Approaches for Disaster-Resilient Communities. On August 13 from 1-2:30 p.m. ET, EPA will host a webinar to share the findings from this project, highlight smart growth strategies communities can use to become more flood resilient, and discuss what the state of Vermont and communities in the Mad River Valley have done since Irene to enhance flood resilience by building back better than before. The webinar will feature speakers from FEMA, the state of Vermont, and the Mad River Valley Planning District. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) Office of Brownfields and Land Revitalization is accepting applications for Brownfields Area-Wide Planning Grants. Eligible activities include research, technical assistance and training for entities who wish to develop an area-wide plan for brownfields assessment, cleanup, and subsequent reuse. This funding opportunity references the Partnership for Sustainable Communities' (PSC) Six Livability Principles and gives favorable consideration to applicants leveraging other PSC grants, including HUD's Sustainable Communities grants. Partnership for Sustainable Communities Releases Five Year Anniversary Report

In celebration of the fifth anniversary of the <u>Partnership for Sustainable Communities</u>, HUD, DOT, and EPA released <u>"Partnership for Sustainable Communities: Five Years of Learning from Communities and Coordinating Federal Investments"</u> this week. The report shows how the three agencies are changing their policies and removing barriers to help communities provide more housing choices, make transportation systems more efficient and reliable, and create vibrant neighborhoods while protecting the environment. The NADO Research Foundation's reflections on the impact of the Partnership are also featured in this publication.

Since 2009, the Partnership for Sustainable Communities has been working to ensure that HUD, DOT, EPA and other federal agency investments better serve communities. Through the Partnership's efforts, more than \$4 billion in grants and technical assistance has been awarded to 1,000 communities in all 50 states, Washington, D.C., and Puerto Rico. Communities are using this assistance to plan economic development and leverage private and other public resources to maximize the Partnership's investments. Upcoming Climate Adaptation Workshop: Think Resiliently, Act Regionally

In recent years, regional governance and collaboration has emerged as one of the best ways for diverse communities to come together to promote climate adaptation and resilience and to attract state and federal assistance. In several places, multi-jurisdictional collaboratives have formed to invent new ways of coordinating, both horizontally (across local governments) and vertically (among local, state, and federal agencies). Join teams from across the country at varying stages of adopting and implementing regional collaboratives at the Institute for Sustainable Communities (ISC) upcoming Sustainable Communities Leadership Academy, Think Resiliently, Act Regionally, a workshop exploring the best practices, challenges, and opportunities associated with collaboration on climate adaptation and resilience at the regional scale. The three-day workshop will take place October 14-16 in Alexandria, VA.

Applicants will need to pull together a team of senior local officials and key stakeholders. The team leader should be someone engaged in the coordination or governance of a regional collaborative process or someone who aspires to foster such a collaborative; four additional stakeholders can be decision-makers in public works and infrastructure, local and regional planning, emergency response, natural resource management, or other areas related to climate adaptation. There is a \$500 registration fee per person, which includes breakfast, lunch, and refreshments. Limited financial assistance is available to offset this fee. ISC will cover flight costs up to \$500 and two-night hotel stays for five team members; any additional team members will be responsible for their own costs.

Apply to be Part of the Rockefeller Foundation's 100 Resilient Cities Challenge

We can't predict the next disruption or catastrophe, but we can control how we respond to these challenges. We can adapt to the shocks and stresses of our world and transform them into opportunities for growth. The Rockefeller Foundation's 100 Resilient Cities Challenge is looking for 100 cities that are ready to build resilience to the range of social, economic, and physical challenges that cities face. Selected cities will be eligible to receive funding to hire a Chief Resilience Officer, technical support to develop a resilience strategy, access to a platform of innovative private and public sector tools to help design and implement that strategy, and membership in the 100 Resilient Cities Network.

The challenge is open to cities, defined as legal governmental entities with populations of over 50,000 possessing a municipal government or other elected or appointed chief executive officer uniquely assigned to govern that population. Only one entry per city will be eligible for consideration. All entrants must submit a letter of support from the highest-ranking elected or appointed representative of the city government (generally a mayor, city chief executive officer, or city manager). Major institutions (e.g., nonprofit organizations, universities, or chambers of commerce) that are affiliated with a city may apply on the city's behalf if: (1) the highest ranking official indicates agreement with all entry form answers in the letter of support; and (2) the entry form includes at least one city contact and valid email address.
