



- Good planning is critical for resiliency.
- Comprehensive Economic Development Strategies (CEDS) serves as an important mechanism to help regions identify vulnerabilities and withstand or recover from disruptions.
- In January 2015, EDA published new CEDS Content Guidelines that encourage communities to incorporate resilience into their long-term economic development plans.
 - ü Guidelines on EDA's website: www.eda.gov/CEDS
- To enhance regional resilience, EDA suggests regions implement *steady-state initiatives* and *responsive initiatives*.
- Integrating/leveraging other planning efforts and resources is key to building resilience.

- Look for opportunities to "cross-pollinate."
- CEDS should align integrate and leverage other regional planning efforts.
- CEDS should identify opportunities for the integrated use of other local, state, private and federal funds.

 - ü Engaging new stakeholders
 - ü Undertaking deeper analyses
 - ü Implementation activities based on inclusive or common set of criteria
 - ü Heightening overall impact








Session 7 Tour: Port of Hood River

The mission of the Port of Hood River is to initiate, promote and maintain quality of life and a healthy economy throughout the Port District and the Columbia River Gorge. Their main focuses include: development, transportation, aviation, and Hood River recreation. These encompass the Hood River-White Salmon bridge, the Waterfront Business Park and recreation areas, and the Ken Jernstedt Airfield and many other projects.

12:40 pm RBS Batten Systems

A family owned and operated business located in Hood River since 1985, RBS specializes in e-glass and carbon fiber epoxy battens to create dependable products. They supply battens for windsurfing, dingy, catamaran, race and megaboat markets throughout the world by working with suppliers and individual customers.


1:20 pm Turtle Island Foods. Key Development

2:00 pm Pfriem Family Brewers 2:30 pm Key Development is a firm that has experience with development, design, construction, and management of a variety of projects. When the Port of Hood River subdivided the Waterfront Business Park, Key Development acted as fee developer for half the lots in the subdivision. They have been working with the Port to incorporate community goals into their development. Turtle Island Foods contracted with Key in 2011 to develop a 45,000 square foot food production plant. The facility is currently on track to achieve a LEED Platinum rating.

Pfriem family Brewers set out to create a brewery that gives the community a warm friendly space where they can experience Pfriem's brewery creations. Pfriem's artisanal beers are influence by the Belgian style but are true to their homegrown roots in the Northwest. They are equipped to produce 1,500 barrels per year initially but will grow with demand to 6,000 barrels distributed throughout the PNW in kegs and bottles. They were happy to locate their newly designed tasting room and brewing facility at the Port of Hood River's Halyard Building.
