LEGISLATIVE NEWS

Senate Rejects House's "Cut, Cap and Balance" Measure

On July 19, the U.S. House of Representatives passed the "Cut, Cap, and Balance Act of 2011" (H.R. 2560). Mostly a symbolic vote, the measure would allow an increase in the debt limit only if Congress passed a balanced-budget constitutional amendment. It would cut spending by \$111 billion in fiscal 2012 and enforce statutory caps that limit spending as a percentage of gross domestic product over the next 10 years. The measure was rejected by the U.S. Senate on July 22. Even if the measure had passed the Senate, President Obama had already promised to veto the bill.

Meanwhile, the ongoing high-level debt limit negotiations continued this week under mounting pressure to strike a deal before the August 2 deadline. President Obama has asked congressional leaders to come to the White House over the weekend to continue negotiations.

Senate EPW Committee Releases Outline on Surface Transportation Reauthorization

On July 19, Senate Committee on Environment and Public Works (EPW) Chairman Barbara Boxer (D-CA), released an outline of the EPW Committee's long-term surface transportation reauthorization measure, referred to as "Moving Ahead for Progress in the 21st Century" (MAP-21). The outline broadly describes overall funding levels, core programs, performance measurements, project delivery, and planning processes. The proposal would maintain funding at the current levels, include reforms to the nation's transportation programs, and provide assistance for transportation projects under the Transportation Infrastructure Finance and

FAA Headed for Partial Shutdown

The Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) is headed for a partial shutdown starting at midnight on July 22 after Congress left town without approving the 21st extension of funding for the FAA programs. The shutdown will immediately affect all non-essential federal aviation programs, and will suspend some 4,000 FAA employees starting July 23. Essential operations, like air traffic controllers, will operate normally.

The Congressional standoff is over a House provision requiring a minimum distance for Essential Air Service (EAS) airports of 90 miles from the nearest medium or large hub airport which would eliminate 10 airports in current EAS communities. There would also be a \$1,000 per passenger cap on EAS subsidies. Airports requiring a subsidy of more than that would be excluded from the program. This would cut about \$16 million from about \$150 million a year in subsidies for commercial flights to remote and rural areas.

Senators with rural constituencies put up a protest over the House bill including Senate Committee on Commerce, Science, and Transportation Chairman Jay Rockefeller (D-WV), who sent a letter to House Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure Chairman John L. Mica (R-FL) saying that including the EAS provisions would guarantee Senate rejection of the bill. EDA Invites Comment on SC2 Pilot Challenge

On July 11, the Obama Administration announced the launch of Strong Cities, Strong Communities (SC2), a pilot initiative aimed at coordinating the resources of multiple federal agencies to strengthen the capacity of local governments and stimulate economic growth. Through the SC2 Pilot Challenge, the Economic

Development Administration (EDA) will offer \$1 million each to six cities—one in each of EDA's six regions—to conduct a challenge competition to develop a blueprint for economic development for each city and region. DOL Requests Comments on Workforce Programs

The Department of Labor (DOL)'s Employment and Training Administration (ETA) is conducting a preclearance consultation program and inviting comments concerning the collection of information for State Integrated Workforce Plan Requirements for Workforce Investment Act (WIA), Wagner-Peyser Act and DOL Workforce Programs, and for Unified Plan Requirements. The preclearance consultation program helps to ensure that data can be provided in the requested format, the reporting burden is minimized and collection instruments are understood, and assesses the impact of collection requirements on respondents. RBS to Amend Business and Industry Guaranteed Loan Program Regulations

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Rural Business-Cooperative Service (RBS) announced that it is amending its regulations for the Business and Industry Guaranteed Loan Program in order to ensure that the agency has sufficient rights for reimbursement when an agency-guaranteed portion of a loan is sold to a holder. This rule will go into effect on September 2 unless RBS receives significant adverse comments by August 18. OMB Requests Comments on Evaluation of the WIA Adult and Dislocated Worker Program

The U.S. Department of Labor submitted a request for Office of Management and Budget (OMB) approval of a proposed information collection in order to evaluate the Adult and Dislocated Worker Program in the Workforce Investment Act (WIA).

In conformance with the Paperwork Reduction Act of 1995, OMB invites comments on the proposed information collection for the Adult and Dislocated Worker Program in order to ascertain: (a) whether the information collection is necessary for the property performance of the agency; (b) the accuracy of the agency's estimate of the burden of the proposed collection of information; (c) ways to enhance the quality, utility, and clarity of the information to be collected; and (d) ways to minimize the burden of the collection of information on respondents.

Negative Impacts to Rural Communities Anticipated from Possible AT&T-T-Mobile Merger

In March, AT&T announced a proposed \$39 billion merger with T-Mobile. The proposed merger would reduce the total number of nationwide cell phone carriers to three, and is subject to approval by the Department of Justice and the Federal Communications Commission (FCC). In his article, "If Phone Giants Merge: A Rural Take," Paul Desai examines the potential impacts of the merger to rural communities. Desai argues that the merger would result in a less competitive system, and reduce incentives to invest in rural networks.
