



Typical Inspection Vehicle





Star Ratings based on Road Protection Score

- Provide star ratings based on safety features of specific sites
 - ✓ Crash Likelihood
 - ✓ Crash protection
- Can supplement and explain risk maps
- Useful when crash data are limited
- Produce Safety Investment Plans
 - ✓ Identifies cost-effective engineering solutions
