





 - = Quality of place to advance economic competitiveness



Lessons Learned: Regional Innovation

- Regional governance leadership, not regional govt.
 - Public, private and nonprofit collaboration
- Risk management, especially political appetite for risk
- Motivation, culture and ability to start new ventures
- Sustained, long-term public policy framework that transcends elected official terms and short-term views

Lessons Learned: Regional Innovation

Technical assistance

- Public, private and nonprofit collaboration
- Working regionally across political and sector boundaries
- Data collection, analysis and know-how
- Sustaining coalitions after the planning phase and

when the grant runs out!

Regional resiliency

What is RUCS?

Since starting the Blueprint project in 2002, the Sacramento region has taken a new approach to addressing transportation, land use and air quality issues. Building on Blueprint, the Rural-Urban Connections

Strategy (RUCS) looks at the region's growth and sustainability objectives from a rural perspective. In the same way that Blueprint is an economic development strategy for urban areas, this project will be an economic and environmental sustainability strategy for rural areas.

Working Groups

SACOG is assembling working groups around core topic areas to help further understand what is currently happening around our region, address rural challenges and cultivate our unique opportunities. Through the working group process, SACOG is working directly with rural stakeholders, citizens, businesses, and public agencies to form strategies that enhance agriculture and rural economies, resource conservation, recreation, quality of life, and regional sustainability. This work will broaden the region's understanding of how land use and transportation investments affect rural areas.

Current Status

The Rural-Urban Connections Strategy has been moving forward in its second year of work. With input received at workshops, staff has developed three working papers in the topic areas of land use, transportation, and local markets. The draft papers are available for review and comments at: www.sacog.org/rucs/wiki. Staff is currently collecting more input in all three topic areas through electronic surveys and upcoming workshops.

- Regulations: Navigating Federal and State Environmental Guidelines







Access to Business Detail




Kansas Opportunity Innovation Network





Four Principles of Wealth Creation

- 1. Focus on place.
- 2 Incentivize collaboration
- Create multiple forms of wealth.
- 4. Emphasize local ownership.

The principles underlying the wealth creation approach are simple. Respect people and their places. Help people collaborate and tap new markets based on shared values. Build many kinds of wealth so everyone benefits. Keep wealth local.

1. Focus on place: "There isn't one way to do rural development," says Deb Markley of the Center for Rural Entrepreneurship, who is the coordinator of the Resource Team for the WCRC initiative. Development will look different in Mississippi, Appalachia, or rural Kansas. "You start where people are and help them get to where they want to be," she says.

Place-based development means recognizing the assets inherent in a particular place – and respecting and building on the work people are already doing

there. It means recognizing the cultural and political challenges of that place, and helping people build the capacity to overcome those challenges. In poor areas, it means connecting people to new ideas, markets, and partners in the mainstream economy for mutual benefit.

In some areas of Appalachia, for example, "the coal companies own everything, and there are consequences if you speak out in public," says Mikki Sager, vice president of The Conservation Fund and a member of the WCRC Resource Team. In the South, racial discrimination has


