Reasons for the Change

- The 113th Congress is unlikely to produce major policy changes with EDA or any of the other federal programs utilized by NADO members
- In the absence of major policy changes, NADO believes the Washington Policy Conference is the perfect opportunity to start and expand on relationships with Members of Congress and their staff
- Having a solid working relationship with your Member of Congress will pay dividends in future years when new policy is being formulated
- NADO on the Hill is designed to educate our members on the importance of advocacy and to assist in this process



Benefits of the Change

- Learn the importance of having a relationship with Members of Congress and staff
- Learn how to initiate contact and how to establish and maintain these important relationships
- Learn how these relationships can help lead to positive policy changes that benefit local development districts
- NADO on the Hill is designed to make our members comfortable with what may be a new process for many and dispel some of the myths surrounding Hill advocacy



Setting Up Meetings

- Call your Representative's Washington, DC office. This information can be found at www.house.gov or by calling NADO legislative staff
- State that you have a meeting request and ask for the Representative's scheduler or executive assistant
- Most offices have set procedures for scheduling requests which you will have to follow
- If asked to submit a written request (likely), this should be a short email or letter stating your group's name, a brief description of what you do, a list of who will be attending and the date and time you are requesting
- Your request should clearly state that you would like to meet with the Representative, but that legislative staff would also be acceptable if the Representative is not available
- Most importantly, make it clear that merely want to meet the Member or staff to talk about the work your organization is performing in their district



Who You Will Meet

- If available, you will meet with your Member of Congress
- For NADO members not familiar with their Representative, read the biography on their website. If you cannot find this, NADO legislative staff will be happy to provide one
- If your Representative is not available, you will likely meet with legislative staff (either the Chief of Staff, Legislative Director, or a Legislative Assistant). All of these individuals will be able to discuss the work your organizations perform
- Congressional staff are often from the Representative's home district and have a working knowledge of local issues
- Congressional staffers are young. You will likely be meeting someone between the ages of 26 and 32. Do not be intimidated...they are there to help you!



Emphasize Relationship Building

- The Objective of NADO on the Hill is for you to build a working relationship with your Representative and their staff
- Emphasize that your goal is to let them know what work you are performing in their district
- Some of you will meet with newly elected members. This is the perfect opportunity to introduce them to your work!
- Invite your Representative and staff to tour a project you are performing in their district



No Hard Ask

- Congressional offices often expect people they meet with to ask them to take some specific action on your behalf, such as signing a letter or voting for or against a specific piece of legislation
- This is not the purpose of your meetings!
- Representatives and staff are used to being barraged with requests, so an informational meeting in which they can learn about things happening back home are valued
- You do not have to discuss detailed policies or legislative issues
- Your goal is for your Representative and their staff to know what work you are doing in their district
- If asked for your opinion on a topic with which you are familiar, give your honest answer
- If asked about a topic with which you are not familiar, tell them that issue isn't one your work with frequently



What NADO Staff Will Do to Help

- Identify your Member of Congress
- Provide background on your Member of Congress
- Determine how to submit a meeting request
- Schedule meeting request
- Tell you how to get to the correct office on Capitol Hill
- Attend your meeting with you if that would make you more comfortable with the process!



Summary

- NADO on the Hill is an exciting new opportunity for our members
- Establishing relationships with your Member of Congress will provide many long-term benefits for your organization
- Inviting your Member of Congress to tour a project in their district will give them a positive picture of your organization
- NADO Legislative staff are here to provide information and support throughout the Washington Policy Conference and your meetings on Capitol Hill
