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Effects of My Disaster

- Extremely difficult experience no precedence in my life no plan
 Still not 100% recovered
- Financial, physical, emotional toll was heavy
- Even though my income did not stop
 - ✓I was on salary with UT
 - This is NEVER true of a business

✓No production = no sales = no income

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What is a Business Recovery Plan?

- A plan to "quickly", restore the viability of a business
 - ✓By "Quickly" we mean within days
- Employees and supervisors devise real actions to address all types of interference with commerce

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Statistics for Businesses Survival After Disaster

✓40% do not reopen

Another 25% that do reopen fail within 1 year

✓90% of all will fail within 2 years

- ✓Here is a brief overview

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Meeting of Key Personnel

- Ist meeting of Bus Recovery Team, held by key corporate officer. Report out to all employees
- Communicate to team that plan is for them as much as the company. Why?
- There are costs in employee time & materials
- Management commitment



Steps in the Process

- It is a big task and must be divided among key personnel
- Management support essential
- Operational procedures mapped, segmented
- Assignment of duties to specific people
- ✓ Report deadlines set
- ✓ Overall completion date set
- Testing of the plan is mandatory

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Who are Key Personnel

- \checkmark Picking the right team is important
 - Report team to all employees
- ✓ Self starters
- ✓Knowledgeable in some part of process
- ✓Likes a challenge
- Good communicator
- Committed to business in good times and bad
- ✓Trust worthy

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The Plan

- Different approaches. Decide what will work for your company.
 - "What if..." scenarios
 - "Bottom up" analysis



Connect the planning to the Process Safety Management

- ✓ Trade Associations may have information
- Involve local emergency planning committees (LEPCs)
- ✓Info available in public domain internet

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The Plan (continued)

What you get out = what you put in
 Management leadership is essential
 Must communicate why the Plan is needed
 Job security (Paycheck security)
 Company survival
 Have each team member write up the "best

way to do this"

✓This creates "buy-in"

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The "CAR" Model

- Developed to focus on the end product
- "C" = Collaborate
 "A" = Allocate
- "R" = Ruminate

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Collaborate

Employees and Suppliers

Employees may surface existing problems when analyzing the process. Do it any way.

Discussing your process with suppliers may require a non-disclosure agreement

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Allocate

VAllocate the resources to the tasks

Assign your human resources (people)

- ✓To do the research
- To do the work needed
- ✓Assign financial resources
 - ✓Time is money and there will be other expenses

Assign the report writer

Must be able to write a clear and consise report

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Ruminate

Thinking through the various parts is essential Lack of continuity is a common problem VSample questions to ponder VHow will The Plan impact the company? \checkmark How will customers connect to the company? ✓How will we deliver our process? \checkmark How will we provide "everything we need, an nothing that we don't"

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Testing the Plan

Test the process without notification
 If you cannot test it, it is just a "paper plan"
 Designing a good test is disruptive to production

- One method is to walk up to any machine and designate that machine "inoperable"
- If your Plan is sufficient, production will resume in a short time

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Standard Emergency Management System Incident Command System Includes info on terrorist events Recovery Committee Informational tools to promote recovery SBA provides info on state and fed recovery programs

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 ICS process - Federal Law mandates all incidents that might cause harm to people, property, and the environment, must be managed by an Incident Command System
 ICS training free from FEMA's web site, Computer based with certifications
