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Thank you for joining us in Nashville for *Weathering the Storm* – we're glad you're here!

Across the country, many communities that have been impacted by natural disasters in recent years are looking for ways to strengthen their local and regional economies through innovative partnerships and robust small business support. The ability of businesses to withstand natural disasters is essential for the recovery and resilience of communities and regional economies as a whole. When businesses get back up and running quickly after severe weather events, residents are able to work and obtain access to the goods and services they need, making them more likely to return to their homes. The ripple effects of business closures on interdependent businesses within a supply chain can also be avoided. Moreover, strong business resilience can mitigate the longer-term economic impacts of disasters, such as increased unemployment, reduced tax revenues, disinvestment, and recession. Creative public-private partnerships, collaboration, and innovative programming can make local businesses, and the economy as a whole, better prepared to withstand and bounce back from future disruptions.

This workshop convenes participants from throughout the Southeastern United States to share their experiences in the wake of recent natural disasters and other economic disruptions, discuss lessons learned in recovering from those disasters, and identify strategies to become better prepared for future events. The workshop will include training sessions highlighting tools to identify regional vulnerabilities and to engage local businesses in continuity planning and opportunities to network with peers and strengthen regional partnerships. Participants will also learn from the experiences of our host city through a mobile learning opportunity showcasing local business and community recovery efforts. Nashville, and the surrounding region, was severely impacted by the 2010 flooding of the Cumberland River.


