Economic Diversification News

The <u>Christian Science Monitor reports</u> on a variety of efforts across Appalachia that are **supporting the growth of small businesses and fostering entrepreneurship** to diversify local and regional economies. From the article: "Perhaps more

than at any time in the past, the focus is on bootstrap ingenuity – encouraging a more entrepreneurial economy. The goal is not just to pump money into the region, but to help communities like Hindman [Kentucky] foster the desire and have the tools to build a new future for themselves, one small business at a time." - Route 50 highlights Wise, Virginia's economic diversification strategy which includes initiatives underway to support advanced manufacturing, the drone industry, data centers, downtown redevelopment, and agriculture. Carl Snodgrass, executive director of the Wise County Industrial Authority, discusses the importance of persistence and taking the long-view in these efforts: "It's a little like fishing. It takes time, the results are unpredictable and it doesn't help any to get impatient." Click here to read the article.
- An <u>article</u> from <u>PolicyLink</u> explains how **arts, creative placemaking, and design are supporting economic development** in Appalachian coal country. From the article: "[T]here's a strong network of businesses and nonprofits that are looking beyond coal, and embracing equity-focused regional economic development for marginalized communities creating employment opportunities in technology and innovation, and arts and culture, as even more promising growth industries for the region." - In a piece for West Virginia's State Journal, Zachary Drennen, president of Strong Mountain Communities, announces a pitch contest that will be held at the West Virginia Good Jobs Conference in Beckley on November 6-8. From the article: "The contest is divided into five business categories, each of which is likely to have a role in the future of southern West Virginia's economy: agriculture and natural resource use (including post-mine land-use), S.T.E.M., lifestyle and innovation, manufacturing and community impact (nonprofits and social enterprises). Winners in each category will receive awards of \$10,000 and \$5,000 for first and second places, respectively." Click here to read the article.
- The <u>Harlan Daily Enterprise</u> in Kentucky <u>covers</u> a recent Harlan County Chamber of Commerce meeting that discussed the importance of tourism to the area and the **value of working regionally across towns and state lines**. William Tribell of the Bell County Historical Society noted the connection between communities: "We share these borders, we share this traffic...highways pass through these communities." Funding Opportunities and Resources

The <u>US Department of Agriculture</u> (USDA) recently opened the application period for the fiscal year (FY) 2017 <u>Rural Cooperative Development Grant</u> program. The program funds **cooperative development to aid rural communities in**

economic development. More information can be found in the Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA) here.

- ➤ <u>USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service</u> works with farmers, ranchers, and private forest landowners nationwide to identify and address natural resource objectives in balance with operational goals in order to benefit soil, water, wildlife, and related natural resources locally, regionally, and nationally. Applications are now being accepted through **April 21** for grants funded under the <u>Regional Conservation Partnership Program (RCPP)</u>. Through the RCPP, NRCS seeks to co-invest with partners in **innovative**, **workable**, **and cost-effective approaches to benefit farming**, **ranching**, **and forest operations**, **local economies**, **and the communities and resources** in a watershed or other geographic area. - RAND has published a new <u>report</u> that addresses **wages, employment, and STEM education** in Ohio, Pennsylvania, and West Virginia. Click <u>here</u> to download the report.
- The <u>US Census Bureau</u> has provided **updates to the My Congressional District Tool web application**. New information includes 2016 congressional district boundary changes and download capability to .cvs file for both single districts and statewide district data sets. - In a new report, <u>SelectUSA</u> outlines the **impact of foreign direct investment (FDI) in the nation's manufacturing sector**. Key findings show over 2.4 million US jobs in manufacturing are supported by FDI and total FDI stock in US manufacturing totaled \$1.2 trillion in 2015, the greatest amount of any sector. As regional economies change over time, the demand for transportation facilities and services also evolves. As a result of a decline in coal demand and output, private sector freight transportation has decreased. Rail lines and service are a valuable transportation network asset and a concern for maintaining and growing future economic activity that might rely on access to active rail lines. The webinar speakers will use transportation impacts of the decline of coal production in Appalachia as an example to frame the issue of rail preservation for attendees from across in the nation, as well as within the Appalachian region. The speakers will provide context for the economic changes that led to a change in transportation demand as well as suggest public sector strategies to preserve rail connectivity.
