Economic Diversification News

- Three laws recently passed in Colorado will create new opportunities for funding rural broadband infrastructure throughout the state, reports *StateScoop*. From the article: "Gov. John Hickenlooper signed three bills...that will rearrange the funding mechanisms for state investment in rural broadband, potentially bringing an unprecedented \$150 million in new funding to the effort and roll back a rule that localities have said gives incumbent service providers an unfair advantage." - The East Kentucky Advanced Manufacturing Institute opened in February in Paintsville and is providing training in Computer Numerical Control (CNC) machining, reports *Modern Machine Shop*. From the article: "[S]tudents beg[i]n their curriculum with classroom instruction. After learning the fundamentals of machining, they receive basic experience on a manual machine center before moving to CNC vertical machine centers (VMCs) and ending with CNC turning centers." - Wyoming's statewide economic diversification initiative, ENDOW, has identified maintaining reliable air service as one of its key priorities and the state department of transportation has offered a plan to do so, reports the *Casper Star-Tribune*. From the article: "The plan is to use a so-called "capacity purchase agreement" to ensure reliable, convenient, and affordable air service across Wyoming...Under the WYDOT plan, the State of Wyoming would assume the role of carrier, negotiating a contract for a provider to offer certain flights, at certain times, to and from certain cities and at prices dictated by the state." - The Robert C. Byrd National Aerospace Education Center in Bridgeport, West Virginia trains students in a variety of technical areas and seeks to engage with displaced coal workers, reports WV News. From the article: "Ralph Workman, director of the Robert C. Byrd Institute aerospace program, said they will be working to build upon their already robust partnerships to develop and sustain a proof-of-concept center in an area that's prepared for it. "From a training standpoint, we want to take the local workforce and create synergy with" the Robert C. Byrd National Aerospace Education Center, he said. "We would like to get displaced coal miners or current clients and get them involved with a four- or five-week course...to get them familiar with machinist training."" Click here to read the article.
- A recent event in Billings, Montana explored the future of the coal industry in the state, reports the Billings Gazette. From the article: "The majority of 15 panelists discussing coal's future throughout the day were amenable to pursuing technology to capture coal pollution, though some said the United States lacked the political will to attempt saving the coal industry, either by aggressively pursuing technology or supporting subsidies. And there was the issue of whether the bill for clean coal technology would jack up the price of coal power, which is already being undercut by natural gas and renewable energy." As energy prices rise in parts of Appalachia, K-12 students in Kentucky are undertaking projects to embrace renewable energy and promote energy conservation at their schools, reports the *Allegheny Front*. From the article: "[Students at Arlie Boggs Elementary] were able to work with a former student, who had recently launched Bluegrass Solar, a solar installation company based in Letcher County. The three solar panels that sit on the school's roof are used mainly to charge the classroom laptops, which Boggs said has reduced the school's energy costs by about \$600 each year. The school district shares some of those savings with the school as an incentive for energy conservation." Click here to read the article.

Funding Opportunities and Resources

- The U.S. Department of Agriculture Rural Development (USDA-RD) is accepting applications for Renewable Energy Systems and Energy Efficiency Improvement projects. The projects help agriculture producers and small businesses lower their energy costs and use through renewable energy and energy efficiency improvements. The deadline to apply for grants is April 30; loan applications are accepted throughout the year. More information is available here.
- The Department of Labor's Employment and Training Administration (ETA) has opened applications to fund research of workforce program management and effectiveness. The Reentry Projects initiative supports assessment of workforce programs and development of models supporting employment outcomes for targeted populations, including adult and youth. ETA is especially interested in supporting apprenticeship models. Awards are approved at up to \$4.5 million per project. Proposals are due May 4. The Funding Opportunity Announcement is available here.
- The U.S. Department of Agriculture's <u>Agricultural Marketing Service</u> has **opened applications for the Farmers Market Promotion Program (FMPP)**. FMPP supports production and marketing of local and regional agricultural products. Eligible applicants include agricultural businesses and cooperatives, economic development corporations, nonprofits, and regional farmers market authorities. Applications are due May 7. - The Employment and Training Administration (ETA) is accepting applications to the National Health Emergency (NHE) Dislocated Worker Demonstration Grant Program. Grants are available for projects to retrain workers in communities impacted by widespread opioid use, addiction, and overdose. The agency expects to award seven to ten demonstration projects between \$500,000 to \$5 million each. - The <u>Rockefeller Foundation</u> and <u>Chan Zuckerberg Initiative</u> have announced new funding through the <u>Communities Thrive</u> <u>Challenge</u>. The purpose of this challenge is to **fund and help to strengthen and scale community-driven approaches that** enable low-income or otherwise financially insecure people find and retain well-paid and meaningful work, achieve financial security, or build economically vibrant neighborhoods. This might include nonprofit programs; businesses,

organizing or advocacy models; technologies; economic development strategies, or other approaches that deliver significant and consistent results in any of the following areas. Register by **June 12** and apply by **June 19**. Click <u>here</u> to learn more.

- The <u>Charles A. Frueauff Foundation</u> offers funding for projects in the areas of education, human services, and health. Funding is available to support specific initiatives in economic development, health education, and healthcare facilities. Applications are due July 1. More information on application guidelines, eligibility, and previously-awarded projects is available <u>here</u>.
- Rural Local Initiatives Support Corporation (RURAL LISC) provides loan funding for improvements to rural community facilities through its Growing Rural Communities Fund. The Fund offers low-interest loans to eligible public facilities including health care centers and educational facilities in communities under 20,000 population. More information is available here.
- The <u>Walmart Community Foundation</u> is accepting applications to its Community Grant Program. The Foundation awards grants to nonprofits and agencies **involved in community and economic development, public safety, and environmental sustainability**. Awards range between \$250 to \$5,000.
