Economic Diversification News

- Wyoming is seeking to **boost opportunities in the aerospace and defense industries by growing, recruiting, and launching companies**, reports *KCWY*. From the article: ""Instead of being dependent on one market or industry like the energy industry, with its ups and downs, we're trying to smooth that out by bringing another industry in that has similar requirements for similar skills of our workforce," [said Charles Walsh, CEO of the Casper Area Economic Development Alliance]." - Two articles highlight **how Teleworks USA is creating quality remote work opportunities for residents in Eastern Kentucky**. From the *Richmond Register*: "Through the work of Teleworks USA...more than 150 people are working remotely in Owsley County. This represents more than \$3 million in new wages being paid to citizens by remote-work companies." Click [here](#) to read the article. From the *Harlan Daily Enterprise*: ""Yesterday, we were fortunate enough to be able to speak to a group of people in Hazard (about) our Teleworks USA hub," [said Harlan County Judge-Executive Dan Mosley]. "We (spoke to) approximately 15 companies...Four of the 15 are already doing business with Teleworks, but 11 of them are looking at using Teleworks USA for training for their employees."" - Google is building a **\$600 million data center on the site of the Widows Creek Fossil Plant, a coal power plant in Bridgeport, Alabama**, reports the *Times Free Press*. From the article: "Google was attracted to the site on the Tennessee River because of the availability of land, water, labor, and clean renewable energy. TVA can use some of the existing power lines for the data center's electricity demand and has pledged to provide Google renewable solar, wind, or hydro-generated power to comply with Google's desire to use 100 percent clean energy." - *Utah Business* provides a snapshot of the future of the coal industry in the state, which will be part of a more varied energy mix. From the article: "Dr. Laura Nelson, director of the Governor's Office of Energy Development, says **we'll still use coal in the future because using a diverse group of energy resources is the key to affordability and sustainability**...We're not here to pick winners and losers when it comes to our resources," says Nelson, the governor's energy adviser. "We're still going to use coal. But how we use it might look different."" Click [here](#) to read the article.
- *CNBC* covers a wide range of diversification initiatives underway in Appalachia that are supporting workforce development, job retraining, and improved infrastructure. From the article: "The challenge, [says Michael Cornett, director of agency expansion and public relations of the Eastern Kentucky Concentrated Employment Program], is to **get miners to see themselves in a different light, and to reimagine how to take the skills they have and apply them to another occupation**. Heavy-equipment operators, truck drivers, mechanics, and engineers from the coal industry may be able use their know-how in a variety of businesses, including the fledgling drone industry that's emerging." Funding Opportunities and Resources

- The [U.S. Department of Agriculture – Rural Development](#) (USDA-RD) is accepting applications for Renewable Energy Systems and Energy Efficiency Improvement projects. The projects help **agriculture producers and small businesses lower their energy costs and use through renewable energy and energy efficiency improvements**. The deadline to apply for grants is **April 30**; loan applications are accepted throughout the year. More information is available [here](#).
- The Department of Labor’s [Employment and Training Administration](#) (ETA) has opened **applications to fund research of workforce program management and effectiveness**. The Reentry Projects initiative supports assessment of workforce programs and development of models supporting employment outcomes for targeted populations, including adult and youth. ETA is especially interested in supporting apprenticeship models. Awards are approved at up to \$4.5 million per project. Proposals are due **May 4**. - The U.S. Department of Agriculture’s [Agricultural Marketing Service](#) has **opened applications for the Farmers Market Promotion Program (FMPP)**. FMPP supports production and marketing of local and regional agricultural products. Eligible applicants include agricultural businesses and cooperatives, economic development corporations, nonprofits, and regional farmers market authorities. Applications are due **May 7**. - The Center for American Progress has released a new report, “Rural Pragmatism: Lessons from Colorado’s North Folk Valley” that highlights efforts **underway to support economic diversification in this coal region through renewable energy, outdoor recreation, agriculture, and more**. - The [Rockefeller Foundation](#) and [Chan Zuckerberg Initiative](#) have announced new funding through the [Communities Thrive Challenge](#). The purpose of this challenge is to **fund and help to strengthen and scale community-driven approaches that enable low-income or otherwise financially insecure people find and retain well-paid and meaningful work, achieve financial security, or build economically vibrant neighborhoods**. This might include nonprofit programs; businesses, organizing or advocacy models; technologies; economic development strategies, or other approaches that deliver significant and consistent results in any of the following areas. - The [Charles A. Frueauff Foundation](#) offers **funding for projects in the areas of education, human services, and health**. Funding is available to support specific initiatives in economic development, health education, and healthcare facilities. Applications are due **July 1**. - [Rural Local Initiatives Support Corporation](#) (RURAL LISC) provides **loan funding for improvements to rural community facilities through its Growing Rural Communities Fund**. The Fund offers low-interest loans to eligible public facilities including health care centers and educational facilities in communities under 20,000 population.
