Economic Diversification News

- American Metal Works, a company based in Paintsville, KY, is providing new advanced manufacturing job opportunities for former coal miners, reports WYMT. From the article: "With the demand for advanced manufacturing comes the demand for a skilled workforce. Scott Bowen says American Metal Works came into his life at just the right moment. "I worked in the coal industry in a town next door over there in Salyersville for 14 years. And you know I just thought that I would retire from there. But the coal industry did what it did and I found myself not knowing how I was going to support my wife and two young children," said Bowen. "A lot of skills I had at Mineral Labs, that's where I worked at, transferred over to this. And I have new hope, you know, I'll retire at American Metal Works," said Bowen." - A proposed 30,000-acre windfarm in Laramie County, WY could provide energy to 70,000 homes in Northern Colorado, reports the *Gillette News Record*. From the article: "It would become one of northern Colorado's largest sources of wind power, tripling what Platte River now uses, according to documents. In addition to turbines, an above-ground, 80- to 100-foot transmission line would carry power from the wind farm to Rawhide Energy Station near Wellington, Colorado. The project is expected to establish 250 temporary construction jobs and 10 full-time jobs but, because project representatives were not available for comment, it is unclear how many of those jobs will benefit Wyoming's economy. After completion, ranchers would resume using the property for grazing." Click here to read the article.
- West Virginia's energy representatives recently gathered at the 2018 West Virginia Chamber's Annual Meeting and Business Summit and discussed a variety of issues including energy diversification, reports the Register-Herald. From the article: "While largely discussing the impact of natural gas on the market, at its heart the discussion was about diversification. "For years coal was the base of everything we did," said Bob Orndorff, the West Virginia state policy director for Dominion Energy. "It still is. It still has a role, but we also need to talk about wind, we need to talk about solar because the Procter and Gambles of the world want that. If we are to recruit companies to work in West Virginia, we need to meet their needs." Orndorff called Dominion's view as an all-in strategy, meaning using all sources of available energy. He called for the state to do the same." Click here to read the article.
- At a meeting of the Grand Junction, CO Area Chamber of Commerce, Eric Eddings, associate dean of research at the College of Engineering at the University of Utah, discussed possibilities for alternative uses of coal, reports the *Grand Junction Sentinel*. From the article: "Eddings suggests that people shift their mindset on coal from an energy resource to a raw material for use. This would be similar to petroleum, which can be burned for fuel, but also is in items such as plastic and clothing...One possibility for coal would be a conversion to rare earth materials, which are found in batteries, magnets, electronics, and military products...Eddings also focused on the possibility of converting coal into a carbon fiber,

which is used in items such as sporting goods, aerospace applications, wind turbine blades, and other specialty applications." Click here to read the article.

Forbes profiles the winners of this year's 2018 Abandoned Mine Land Reclamation Awards from the Office of Surface Mining Reclamation and Enforcement (OSMRE). From the article: "OSMRE honors merited state regulatory agencies and coal mining companies with two award programs annually: one for reclamation projects at coal-mined lands abandoned prior to the Surface Mining Control and Reclamation Act of 1977, the other for reclamation of mines which began operations after passage of the law...Reclamation—basically, returning lands to conditions similar or innovative—has led to adaptive land uses for sites, like farms and pastures, public parks and athletic fields, and ecological restoration for wildlife and wetlands. Forestry reclamation is paramount in some coalfield communities, to regain healthy, productive forests and prevent landslides." Click here to read the article.

Funding Opportunities and Resources

- The Foundation for Rural Service is accepting **grant applications from rural communities to support business and community development, education, and telecommunications**. Priority is given to projects in broadband development. The deadline to apply is **September 15**. Program guidelines and instructions to apply are available <u>here</u>.
- The <u>U.S. Department of Labor</u> (DOL) has announced the availability of \$85 million for YouthBuild programs. YouthBuild is a pre-apprenticeship initiative supporting at-risk youth ages 16-24 through education and skill development opportunities for in-demand jobs. Funding is provided to expand public- and nonprofit-sponsored YouthBuild programs with 85 awards anticipated throughout the country. Awards will be granted from \$700,000 to \$1.1 million with a 25 percent match requirement. Grant recipients with FY2017 funding are not eligible to apply. Applications are due **September 18**. - Does your town or city have an underused public space that would be ideal for outdoor concerts? The <u>Levitt Foundation</u> is now accepting applications for the Levitt AMP [Your City] grant program through **September 25**. Each year, the Levitt Foundation awards \$25K matching grants to up to 15 U.S.-based nonprofits serving small to mid-sized towns and cities to present the Levitt AMP Music Series, **10 free concerts that inject new life into public spaces and create vibrant community destinations**. - The <u>U.S. Department of Agriculture Rural Development</u> (USDA-RD) is **seeking applicants for priority points consideration under the Strategic Economic and Community Development (SECD) program**. To receive priority points, applicants submit proposals which detail projects supporting regional economic development plans in rural areas. If selected,

- points will be awarded to listed projects and recognized by USDA for Rural Development funding. Applications are due **September 30**. Click <u>here</u> for more information.
- The <u>U.S. Department of Labor</u> (DOL) has issued a notice on a sector-based apprenticeship program. The **program, Scaling Apprenticeship through Sector-Based Strategies, aims to increase apprenticeship opportunities in new industry sectors**. DOL will award \$150 million towards 15 to 30 apprenticeship programs. The agency will prioritize applicants that seek to expand apprenticeships within industries with few available learning opportunities and apprenticeships for small to medium-sized businesses. - The <u>U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development</u> has released the **funding matrix and dashboard reports from the Office of Community Planning and Development**. These reports cover the funding information for all cities and states that receive funds from Community Development Block Grants, Continuum of Care, Emergency Solutions Grants, HOME, Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS, and Housing Trust Fund. A Dose of Inspiration

➤ Drax, the largest power plant in Western Europe, is on track to convert to natural gas and biomass by 2023, reports the *BBC*. From the article: "Drax has tried to rebrand itself as a poster boy for what can be done with an old coal plant – where there's enough will and, indeed, money to pay for conversions. Many small coal facilities in the US have recently converted to burning gas – a cheaper kind of transition than biomass. And Drax wants to build large batteries on site to store electricity for when the grid needs it most. There are other, similar projects around the world. A Canadian firm, Hydrostor, has designed schemes for turning old coal plants into compressed air batteries. The air can be released to force the plant's turbines back into action whenever electricity is needed." Click here to read the article.

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
