



We knew before this that the digital divide in our region was wide. The pandemic brought this chasm to light and made clear the scope of the work that still needs to be done to fully connect our region.

6,000 WELLNESS KITS

With supplies from Ohio Department of Aging and help from Marietta College Office of Civic Engagement and the college's athletic teams, 6,000 pandemic wellness kits were distributed to senior housing, senior centers, and community action agencies in Athens, Hocking, Meigs, Monroe, Morgan, Noble, Perry, and Washington counties.

The kits contained reusable masks, hand sanitizer, personal care items, and information about the Aging & Disability resources and services available through Buckeye Hills Regional Council.





INNOVATION

IN SERVICE DELIVERY

The COVID-19 pandemic brought about the closure of congregate sites that many area seniors rely on for meals and social connection. CARES Act funding enabled our region's senior centers to quickly adapt, increasing the availability of home delivered meals, while also adding new services like grab-and-go meals, grocery deliveries, and creating partnerships to provide meals through local restaurants. Additionally, through telephonic check-ins, senior centers stayed in touch with local seniors. Others provided technology to assist seniors with access to evidence-based programs and telehealth services.







400HOLIDAY MEALS

Buckeye Hills staff partnered with the Morgan County Commissioners, Morgan County Office on Aging, and Morgan County Food Pantry to make the holidays a little brighter for 400 seniors and families in need by distributing holiday meals, made possible by the CARES Act.

CARES Act funding also made it possible to stock the Morgan County Food Pantry with various hygiene and sanitation items, as well as shelf-stable food during the holiday season.

INVESTED IN BUSINESS & WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT

Through regional and local initiatives serving Athens, Hocking, Meigs, Monroe, Morgan, Noble, Perry, and Washington counties, 2,500 students were served, 300 business were served, 239 jobs were created, and 300 jobs were retained in 2020.


FINDING WI-FI

The pandemic forced many in Southeast Ohio online for a variety of day-to-day needs. Realizing that not all households have ready or reliable access to internet service, our Mapping + Data team, created a tool to find and share verified Wi-Fi hotspot locations throughout the region. This tool helps with everyday tasks including completion of research and classroom assignments, searching and applying for benefits and relief, and taking advantage of telehealth appointments. RIGHT OF WAY MAP

In partnership with ODOT District 10, our Mapping & Data team combined information about ODOT's rights of way, including scanned maps and supporting documentation, and put it into a viewer so that engineers and contractors know the scope of the property ODOT has rights to in our region. This is an adaptation of an in-house map product, and making it available for public use has significantly reduced the amount of ODOT staff time spent fielding right of way inquiries.







MASKED UP


In partnership with local Emergency
Management Agencies and with support
from the Appalachian Regional
Commission, Buckeye Hills distributed
more than 80,000 masks, gloves, and
gowns to frontline health workers.

An additional 300 cases of masks and sanitizer were provided to local employers by the OhioSE and JobsOhio initiative, "Ohio Safe. Ohio Working."



COMMUNITY HEALTH WORKER

In partnership with Ohio University, Buckeye
Hills Regional Council began utilizing
Community Health Workers to augment our
aging programs in serving older adults and
persons with disabilities. Community Health
Workers followed up on initial contacts and
referrals and assisted older adults in
accessing programs, ensuring they were
connected to community resources and that
their needs were being met.





SAFE RIDES

CARES Act funding through Ohio Department of Transportation made it possible for transportation providers including O'Neill Center, WASCO, and Community Action Bus Lines to purchase equipment and supplies to regularly disinfect non-emergency transport vehicles during the pandemic, thereby mitigating community spread of COVID-19 to the atrisk populations served by these transportation providers.



HOPE GRANT

FOR MEDICAL TRANSIT

A Federal Transit Authority HOPE grant was awarded to Athens Public Transit for a Regional Coordination of Medical Transit project. The goal of the project is to improve access to healthcare and jobs. The project addresses this goal through: regional Medicaid transportation scheduling assessment, advanced fare payment, and electric bus planning. Buckeye Hills RTPO and GIS teams will be contributing to the regional Medicaid transportation scheduling assessment project tasks. If the model developed in Athens County is successful, the intent will be to expand the model into other parts of the Buckeye Hills region with future grant opportunities.



ADVOCATING FOR

BROADBAND

Buckeye Hills Regional Council and the Buckeye Hills Foundation continued to advocate for our region's connectivity needs at the state and federal levels. In the summer of 2020, Buckeye Hills worked with Congressman Bill Johnson's office to challenge carrier claims that would have excluded more than 1,000 square miles of rural Appalachian Ohio and millions of dollars in support for the region's broadband needs from the FCC's Rural Digital Opportunity Fund.

After the announcement of awards to service providers from the Rural Digital Opportunity Fund, Buckeye Hills subsequently analyzed the awards to carriers and made recommendations to the FCC on steps to take during the due diligence period to ensure that the service promised is actually delivered.

Buckeye Hills staff began conversations with BroadbandOhio on how best to meet the connectivity needs of rural Appalachian Ohio and on ways the state can most effectively utilize its resources with additional support from federal programs.

With support from Foundation for Appalachian Ohio and partners throughout Ohio's Appalachian counties, the Buckeye Hills Foundation began working with Reid Consulting Group to develop ConnectingAppalachia.org as the online home of our region's broadband advocacy efforts.

SENIOR FARMERS MARKET NUTRITION PROGRAM ENROLLEES

Buckeye Hills accepted 1,918 applicants for farmers market coupons in 2020. These individuals redeemed more than 15,000 coupons for healthy, fresh produce grown by more than 40 local farmers.

HOME MODIFICATION PROJECTS

In 2020, 38 minor home modification and accessibility projects were completed across Athens, Hocking, Meigs, Monroe, Morgan, Noble, Perry, and Washington counties. These projects allow older adults to remain safely in their homes as they age.

IN MEDICARE SAVINGS

Medicare Open Enrollment is a hectic time in a normal year. In the midst of the pandemic, in-person Medicare check-up events were canceled. Nonetheless, the Buckeye Hills Information & Assistance team served 128 individuals by phone and with private, socially-distanced appointments to help them find combined savings of \$232,753.17 in Medicare Part D premiums.



GROUND BREAKING

The Meigs County Community Improvement Corporation, along with local leaders and elected officials, broke ground in October on a new \$1.9 million speculative industrial building in the East Meigs Industrial Park, the fourth in the development. The construction financing for the project is provided locally by Home National Bank of Racine. The Ohio Department of Development Services Agency (DSA) will provide permanent mortgage financing with a \$1.43 million Rural Industrial Park Loan. The Governors Office of Appalachia awarded a \$250,000 grant to support the project and AEP provided \$10,000 towards the project.

SUBSTANCE USE DISORDER RESOURCES

In August 2020, in partnership with the Ohio Valley Employment Resource (OVER), Buckeye Hills Regional Council hired an Opioid Resource Navigator and launched a new online resource for individuals dealing with addiction. MyRecoveryLink.org serves as a tool for residents of Monroe, Morgan, Noble, and Washington counties suffering from substance use disorder and family members affected by the disorder. This website provides an extensive listing of resources, support meetings, and facilities that serve southeast Ohio.



APPALACHIAN OHIO

TOURISM EXPANSION

The Governor's Office of Appalachia and Tourism Ohio, in partnership with Buckeye Hills Regional Council and Ohio Valley Regional Development Commission, hosted a meeting in January 2020 to discuss expanding tourism in Appalachian Ohio. Meeting highlights included guidance on how tourism partners develop and share information on the "Ohio. Find it Here." website, information about ARC grants for tourism, sharing best practices, and fostering regional partnerships.






