





EDDs are critical to EDA. . .and vital to regional economic development capacity building:


- "Institutional Partnerships" (program design, grantmaking, implementation, information-sharing/convening, etc.)
- Planning for public sector capacity building




# **Growth/Expansion of EDDs**

# Value of Being an EDD

- 1. The EDD receives annual funding from EDA to support development/implementation of the CEDS. This helps to **establish a long-term partnership with EDA** (i.e., preventing a "one-and-done" funding exercise).
- 2. If an EDA implementation project is within an EDD, the project may be located in part of the EDD that does not meet one of the distress criteria, so long as the project provides "substantial direct benefit" to a different geographic area of the EDD that does meet one of the distress criteria.
- 3. The EDD has the privilege of administering implementation projects for low-capacity eligible entities within the EDD on a generally non-competitive basis.
- 4. Areas designated as an EDD were more likely to recover more quickly from the pandemic than areas that did not have this designation. (Argonne National Laboratory, *initial* Effective Framework Analysis, 2022)
- 5. There are higher levels of EDA investment inside of EDD areas per capita than areas outside of EDDs. Between 2010 and 2019, more than 78 percent of EDA grants and 73 percent of total project investment went to areas covered by an EDD, while only 52 percent of the population live in areas with an EDD. Per capita, the number of EDA grants and amount of total project cost invested in EDD areas is more than three times the number of grants and investments outside of EDD areas. (Urban Institute, upcoming EDA Geography Brief, 2023)


- Volume and complexity of federal support for economic development can be difficult to navigate.



# **MRPC** SUCCESS! State Technical College of Missouri Utility Center

50,000 SF building State Tech Campus: Linn, MO

Total Project: \$5.017 M. + EDA Grant: \$2M

Completed in time for Spring Semester 2022 (Jan. 2022)

MRPC provided grant writing and grant administration

- Goal: To provide more trained Utility Technicians for power, broadband, gas, water and wastewater sectors to meet growing demand of utilities industries.
- One graduating class trained so far: 100 students—100% placement; 210 students now in training + additional 100 heavy equipment operators.
- 40 employers hiring students trained through Utility Center
- Spurred another \$12M in investment

#### A Little About the TARCOG Region



- The TARCOG Region is home to 47 municipalities located in five counties (DeKalb, Jackson, Limestone, Madison and Marshall) in Northeast Alabama, and is home to more than 713,000 Alabamians
- TARCOG's largest city, and the largest city in Alabama, is Huntsville, Alabama one of the most dynamic metropolitan areas in the country. In 2022, U.S. News & World Report named Huntsville the #1 Best Place to Live. Forbes has named Huntsville one of the Top 20 Leading Metros for Business and Kiplinger's Personal Finance has named Huntsville one of the country's Top 10 Cities for Raising Families

#### Key Ingredients for a Successful EDD-EDA Partnership



- EDA's **Availability**, **Flexibility**, and **Openness** to our EDD staff has been our Key Ingredient in dreaming big in our Region
- Access to EDA Staff has allowed us to structure programs that meet both EDA's requirements and the needs of our Region
- EDA not only wants to help EDDs develop meaningful projects that will have lasting impacts in our Regions, they want to *make resources available* for these projects
- EDA Staff possesses a *diversity of experiences and expertise* that is a direct benefit to EDD staff this is extremely important when developing innovate projects

#### Mazda Toyota Manufacturing Grade Separation Grant



- EDA Provided \$4.1 Million Dollars in funding for a grade separation project related to the construction of a \$2.3 Billion joint venture project in Huntsville, Alabama in 2019
  - MTM is the first of its kind of joint venture between Mazda and Toyota automakers
  - MTM will employ 4,000 direct employees, and create up to 10,000 more Original Equipment Manufacturer (OEM) jobs throughout the Region
  - TARCOG Economic Development and Planning staff wrote the grant secured the funding needed for this needed infrastructure project
  - As a result of this successful project, TARCOG is seen as a relevant and resourceful economic development partner throughout our Region and the State of Alabama
  - We, and all of the other AARC COGs, are seen as problem solvers as a result of this, and many other EDA funded programs throughout Alabama

#### • EDA Staff Advice – More Training for EDDs
